

13. Skateboards, Rollerblades & Scooters	a. skateboards, rollerblades, scooters, and other rolling devices are not to be brought to school or used on school property. Cell Phones and Electronic Devices</p> <p>Personal Belongings</p>	<p>a. cell phones and electronic devices will only be allowed during free time, which includes before lunch, recesses, lunch, and after school. Texting, listening to music, using headphones, and Internet use are allowed during these times.
